In Louisa County Court Sept. 11<sup>th</sup> 1826

This paper writing purporting to be the last will and testament of Henry Mallong deceased together with the codicils thereto annexed was this day in open Court produced and proved by the oaths of Horatio G. Winston and George W. Trueheart two of the subscribing witnesses thereto and by the Court is ordered to be recorded. And on the motion of John H. Perkins one of the executors named in said Will who made oath as the laws directs and entered into bond with approved security (having first justified on oath as to their sufficiency) in the penalty of Eight Thousand dollars Conditioned as the laws directs a certificate is granted him for obtaining a probate thereof in due form.

I Martha Morris of Louisa County, Virginia make this my last will & testament My just debts are all to be paid. My negro woman Suckey, her Children & grand Children, are to be set free & such of them as are willing sent to the Colony of Liberia in Africa. Such as will not go to Liberia are to be sent to any of the United States where the laws will permit them to live & where they may be willing to go. If they (or any of them) will not go out of this state I desire that application may be made to the Virginia Legislature to permit them to stay here. For their transportation, removal, & maintenance whether they go away or remain in this state I give five hundred dollars out of my estate One hundred and fifty dollars whereof for the benefit of my woman Sall & her Children the remainder for old Suckey, Serena & Susan & such others (their children) as at my death may be unable to provide for themselves, and I wish these sums to be dealt out by my executors at such times & in such portions (in pursuance of the above provisions) as they may deem best for the interest of said slaves. Of the above named plans I most particularly wish for the transportation to Liberia. I desire that all accounts now subsisting between my brother James M. Morris & myself, shall, from & after my death be considered as finally Closed & Settled.


I appoint my s<sup>t</sup> brother James & my nephews Thomas Richard & Edward Garland Executors of this my will.

And in testimony that this is my last will & testament I have hereunto put my hand & seal this thirtieth day of June eighteen hundred & twenty six.

This paper writing purporting to be the last will and testament of Martha Morris deceased was this day produced in open Court and proved by the oath of Sancelot Minor the coexecutor thereto and by the Court ordered to be recorded. And on the motion of Thomas Garland one of the executors named in said will who made oath as the law directs and entered into bond with approved security in the penalty seven thousand five hundred dollars conditioned according to law a certificate is granted him for obtaining a probate thereof in due form Teste

In the name of God amen I Ann Bullock of the County of Louisa taking into Consideration the Certainty of death but being uncertain when it may happen have thought proper whilst in perfect health and senses to make this my last will and Testament which I do in manner following to wit I in the first place desire that my just debts be paid, That then what money I have by me at the time of my death as well as debts which may be due me be equally divided among my three daughters who now live with me to wit Mary, Rebecca and Nancy to them and their heirs forever. The balance of my estate of what ever kind or nature it is my will and desire should be equally divided among all my children or their legal representatives to wit David Bullock, Robert Bullock, Lewis Bullock, Elizabeth Garland, Edward Bullock, Mary Bullock, Rebecca Bullock and Nancy Bullock. The reason why I have given my three daughters now living with me extra legacies is not that I love my other children less than them, But because they have assisted me in making the money and have actually done what I well know my other children would have done similarly situated with them waited on me in both health and sickness with the truest fidelity love and affections I appoint David Bullock Executor to this my last will, signed sealed and pronounced as my last will & Testament this 31<sup>st</sup> day of March 1807.

Thomas Swift I have thought proper to explain my will by this Codicil, by saying that if I should at my death leave more money on hand and debt due me than amounts one hundred pounds a piece for each of my daughters Mary, Rebecca & Nancy I wish the overplus to go to all my children as in my will I have directed the balance of my estate to go to me I give to my three daughters Mary, Rebecca and Nancy my four wheeled riding carriage when one of them marries or dies the other two to possess it.
